HISTORY AND ORGANIZATION of the Distinguished Daughters OF PENNSYLVANIA

Each year a limited number of Pennsylvania women are named Distinguished Daughters of Pennsylvania. They are honored at the Governor's Residence where the Governor and First Lady traditionally present them with medals and citations for their achievements. Distinguished Daughters are women who have brought distinction to the Commonwealth through their voluntary service and/or professional careers.

Instituted during the administration of Governor James H. Duff in 1948 the first awards were made in 1949. Since then, 442 women have been recognized as Distinguished Daughters of Pennsylvania. 176 Distinguished Daughters are living today.

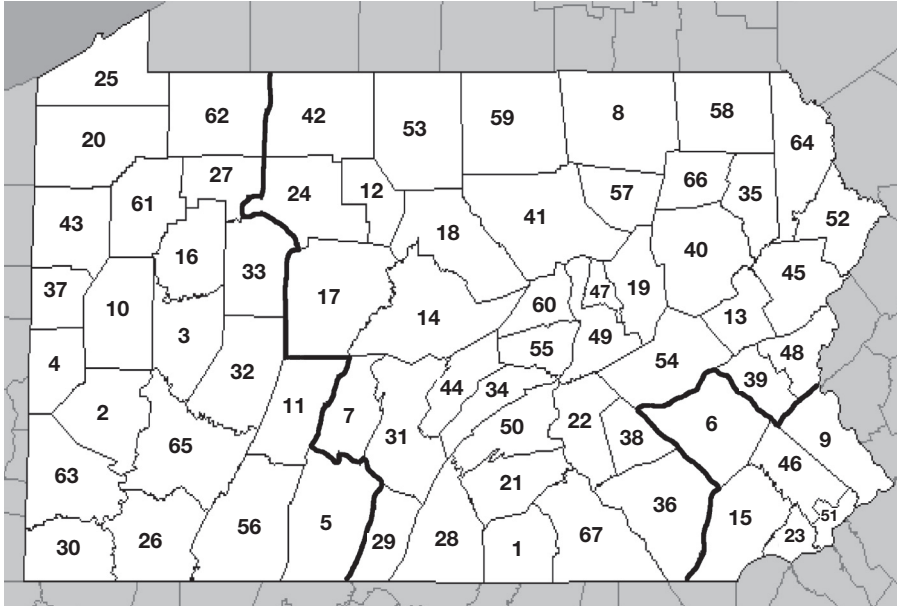
Women proposed to receive this award must be nominated by organizations within the Commonwealth in recognition of outstanding accomplishments of statewide or national importance. They need not be native Pennsylvanians, but must have lived in the state and be identified with it.

The Distinguished Daughters are organized by the eastern, central, and western regions of Pennsylvania, with a chair for each region. The organization's officers are elected on a state-wide basis to coordinate the group's activities, which include the selection of Distinguished Daughter honorees.

Each January, nominating forms are mailed to civic, cultural, professional, and educational organizations throughout the state. Candidates are first reviewed by Distinguished Daughters from the nominees' geographic region, who choose finalists to be considered at the state level. At a subsequent statewide meeting to which all Distinguished Daughters are invited, the annual awardees are selected. Their names are sent to the Governor, who then notifies the new Distinguished Daughters. The Annual Award Luncheon is held in the fall at the Governor's Residence.

This directory summarizes the diverse contributions Distinguished Daughters have made to the state and nation over the past 60 years. The short biography of each extraordinary woman represents only a snapshot of her achievements at the time she received the award, and cannot adequately reflect every aspect of her outstanding service. The Governor's annual awards program brings distinct benefits to the Commonwealth, because the accomplishments of Distinguished Daughters continue to enrich the quality of life for Pennsylvania's citizens for many generations.

BIOGRAPHICAL-CHRONOLOGICAL ROSTER

The biographical paragraphs in the following chronological listing of the Distinguished Daughters, in the order in which they were appointed in successive years by successive Governors, briefly note major achievements of their varied careers. Many Distinguished Daughters have continued to earn new honors in addition to those mentioned in the original citations for which they received the award, the medal and the official recognition. This directory provides the basic identification and indicates the major areas in which these women have made their mark.

Appointments for 1949

***Louise Bush-Brown** (Mrs. James Brown) Ambler

Horticulturist, gifted teacher and administrator, brilliant journalist, head of the Ambler School of Horticulture, she was the founder and editor of the Farmer's Digest, which she nurtured to a successful and influential status, and she spear-headed the small gardens project at Ambler with notable success.

***Anita Porter Clothier** (Mrs. William J. Clothier) Valley Forge

Civic leader, Commander in the U.S. Coast Guard Reserves in World War II, she was founder and president of Emergency Aid, the only woman member of the State Council of Defense, and a member of the Valley Forge Park Commission and Director of Freedom Foundation at Valley Forge.

***Charlotte K. Fasy** (Mrs. Francis I. Fasy) Drexel Hill

President of the Alliance of Catholic Women, she was a leader and supporter of numerous social services, interracial and civic institutions, including hospitals and the campaigns against tuberculosis and cancer, as well as the Red Cross, and scholarships in the field of nursing.

***Lena L. Orlow Ginsberg** (Mrs. Abram Ginsberg) Philadelphia

A member of the bar of Philadelphia, admitted to practice before the Supreme Court of the United States, she was national president of the B'Nai B'Rith, an organization of 120,000 women in 500 communities of the United States. She headed the Philadelphia Conference of Jewish Women's Organizations and was a teacher in programs for displaced persons.

***Vira Heinz** (Mrs. Clifford S. Heinz) Pittsburgh

Philanthropist and civic leader in arts, education and religion, she was an activating force in the Civic Light Opera Company, the Pittsburgh Symphony Society and La Scala Opera Company. She received the Russell Colgate International award for services in religious education, and was a trustee of the Howard Heinz Foundation and Chatham College.

***Althea Kratz Hottel, Ph.D.** (Mrs. A. Stauffer Hottel) Philadelphia

Dean of Women at the University of Pennsylvania and national president of the American Association of University women, she participated with the presidents of national organizations around the world in conferences with government, industrial, labor, business, education and civic leaders in twelve world capitals, making a special report to the President of the U.S.

***Caroline Miller Huber** (Mrs. John Y. Huber, Jr.) Haverford

Active in politics and community affairs, she was vice chairman for the celebration of Pennsylvania Week in 1948, president of the Pennsylvania Council of Republican Women and vice chairman of the Republican State Committee, editing a legislative letter for the Council. She had responsible roles with the Distinguished Daughters, the Business and Professional Women, the Devon Horse Show and Emergency Aid.

***Victoria Lyles, Ph.D.** York

A distinguished educator, who helped prepare school curricula used in every public school in Pennsylvania and materials used nationwide for Education Week, she directed the Department of Kindergarten and Elementary Education in the York schools. Recipient of many honors and awards, she served as president of state and national associations for childhood education.

***Pauline Beery Mack, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Warren B. Mack) State College

An internationally known scientist, an early researcher in food chemistry, nutrition and related fields, she was associated with the Pennsylvania State College for more than three decades. An author and editor of research reports and books, she founded the publication "Chemistry" and received the Carven medal for outstanding achievement in chemical research.

***Katharine Elizabeth McBride, Ph.D.** Bryn Mawr

President of Bryn Mawr College, one of the few women heading such institutions at the time, she carried on research and clinical studies in psychology in Philadelphia Hospital, and served as director of the Child Study Institute, Bryn Mawr. She received many honors for achievements in psychological research.

***Gertrude Howard McCormick** (Mrs. Vance C. McCormick) Harrisburg

Serving as vice president of the company publishing "The Patriot" daily newspaper in Harrisburg, she then became president of the company also publishing "The Evening News" and was an active executive of a group of associated companies. She was a member of the board of the YMCA and a national and international leader in the Girl Scouts.

***Catharine Macfarlane, M.D.** Philadelphia

The first woman elected to the College of Physicians in Philadelphia, she was president of the American Medical Women's Association and vice president of the Medical Women's International Association. As president of the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania, she helped to establish a cancer control program subsequently followed widely in hospitals in the United States and abroad.

***Harriet Duff Phillips** (Mrs. John M. Phillips) Pittsburgh

President of the Pennsylvania Federation of Women's Clubs and a member of the Pittsburgh Board of Education, she was an active civic leader in the Red Cross, the State Board of Assistance and other organizations. She worked for Juvenile Court legislation, the sale of Liberty Bonds during World War I and for other wartime projects. During the influenza epidemic, she organized an emergency hospital and served as its superintendent.

***Maybelle K. Price** (Mrs. Walter Price) Philadelphia

As president of Volunteer Service for the Blind, Inc., she directed a project providing more than 40 thousand pages of Braille and fostered the development of checkbooks, playing cards and other aids in Braille, as well as a Braille edition of Jack and Jill, a magazine for children, which she distributed to 250 schools for the blind.

***Frances Anne Wister** Philadelphia

Interested in music and in the preservation of landmarks, she fostered many activities for the Philadelphia Orchestra and founded the Philadelphia Society for the Preservation of Landmarks. She was president of that Society during the preservation of the Powell House, Elfreth's Alley, and Customs House, and other historical monuments.

***Marion Mackie Wunderle** (Mrs. Horace G. Wunderle) Rydal

Beginning with World War I, she gave active leadership to the Red Cross, the Child Health Committee of Pennsylvania, the Needlework Guild, Good Will Industries, the Seaman's Church Institute, and the Philadelphia Health and Welfare Council. A founder of the Philadelphia and Pennsylvania Associations of Hospital Auxiliaries, she helped set patterns for such organizations in the state and nation.

***Mary Louise Curtis Zimbalist** (Mrs. Efrem Zimbalist) Philadelphia

Founder of the Curtis Institute of Music and president of the Music School of Philadelphia, she carried on a tradition of fostering music and musicians, especially students, established by her father, Cyrus H.K. Curtis. Author of books and articles reflecting her many interests, she was prominent in numerous cultural activities.

Appointments for 1950

***Pearl S. Buck** (Mrs. Richard J. Walsh) Perkasio

Distinguished novelist, Nobel and Pulitzer Prize winner, Pearl Buck worked and wrote for better understanding between the Orient, where she lived for many years, and the nations of the West. She was a member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters. The moving spirit behind Welcome House, home for children of Asiatic and American parents, she set a worldwide example in caring for such children.

***Hannah M. Durham Cooke** (Mrs. Jay Cooke) Zionsville

A magnetic leader in educating women to active participation in politics, she devoted much time to her concern for good citizenship. She was one of the first women to attain a position of importance in the Republican Party and served as a National Committee member. The first woman member of the State Planning Board and the Planning Commission set up after World War II, she was an outstanding public speaker and a respected voice in public life.

***Gabriella Cameron D. Gilbert** (Mrs. Lyman D. Gilbert) Harrisburg

Holder of the American Award of B'Nai B'Rith and the Kiwanis Medal for outstanding community service, she made major contributions to the programs of the Girl Scouts and the YMCA. Providing college scholarships to worthy students was one of her principal interests. She held posts of leadership in many community organizations.

***Mabel Lindsey Gillespie** Pittsburgh

A leader in education, social welfare, church work and public affairs, she was active nationally with the YWCA, the Presbyterian Board of Christian Education, the Foreign Policy Association, and the American College in Cairo, Egypt, among other institutions. Her gift of the Public Affairs Room to the Carnegie Library in Pittsburgh expressed her international and interracial concerns.

***Jessie Royer Greaves** (Mrs. Harry Greaves) Paoli

A pioneer worker for retarded blind children, she made an unique contribution in the education of the handicapped. Starting with one blind child, she created the Royer-Greaves School, which became a modern institution occupying more than a hundred acres, with buildings housing sixty and more children, who spoke of her as "Mother Greaves."

***Sarah Dickson Lowrie** Philadelphia

Journalist, historian, lecturer, she was a founder of the Philadelphia Junior League, League of Women Voters, Lighthouse Settlement, Public Baths Association and other civic and historical organizations. Great-great-granddaughter of a Royal Governor of the Province of Pennsylvania, she became a journalist, writing for major newspapers and magazines.

***Violet Oakley** Philadelphia

A major artist, famous as a portrait painter, she was awarded medals and prizes from all over the world. She painted the murals in the State Capitol in Harrisburg and a mammoth frieze "Great Women of the Bible" in the First Presbyterian Church in Germantown. Her other master works include illustrations for the book, "The Holy Experiment — Our Heritage from William Penn."

***Edith Wilder Scott** (Mrs. Arthur Hoyt Scott) Media

An outstanding horticulturist, she established the Arthur Hoyt Scott Foundation at Swarthmore College. Recipient of the American Home Achievement Medal, the Garden Club of America Medal, and numerous other awards, she was one of the first American women to visit the interior of New Zealand and Samoa, in pursuit of her horticultural studies.

***Florence Barbara Seibert, Ph.D.** Philadelphia

A biochemist at the Henry Phipps Institute, she achieved world fame for tuberculosis research, as the first to produce tuberculin in pure crystalline form. Distinguished teacher and consultant, she received many national and international awards for her scientific achievements; she used any financial prize to buy equipment for continuing research.

***Elsie Singmaster** (Mrs. Harold Lewars) Gettysburg

Widely honored for her colorful tales of the Pennsylvania Dutch and scholarly historical studies, including "Pennsylvania's Susquehanna" and other works read and studied throughout the nation, she received broad critical recognition and acclaim for her research and stories.

***Theodora Cope Sumner Gray** (Mrs. Philip M. Gray) Dimock

Nationally recognized for her scientific writings and research in ecology, she won the John Burroughs Medal in the field of natural history. She wrote "Driftwood Valley," a best-seller in 1946, and other books and articles on wildlife and natural history.

***Mary B. Warburton** (Mrs. Barclay H. Warburton) Philadelphia

A founder of the Pennsylvania Council of Republican Women, soon after women citizens received the right to vote, she was the first woman vice chairman of the State Republican Committee and the first National Committeewoman from Pennsylvania. She earned national and international positions of leadership in the political and social changes of the 1920s.

Appointments for 1951

***Minerva T. Baker** (Mrs. Charles W. Baker, Jr.) Duquesne

Writer, lecturer and teacher, she was a leader in the national and international Lutheran Council of Churches, which she represented at the World Federation sessions in Europe. She received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from Thiel College.

***Anna DePlanter Bowes, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Frederick D. Bowes) Harrisburg

An outstanding nutritionist and a pioneer in the field, she exerted national leadership in medical nutritional education. The author of "Tables of Food Values," she was instrumental in bringing the results of laboratory research directly to the public as Chief of the Division of Nutrition in the Pennsylvania Department of Health.

***Nellie Jane deWitt, Captain, U.S.N.** Susquehanna

The first U.S. Navy nurse to hold the rank of captain, she was influential in obtaining commissioned rank for military nurses in her long and distinguished career. She served five years as Chief of the Navy Nurse Corps and was effectual in establishing the Nurse Training Base in Guam.

***Anna M. Gray** (Mrs. Alfred W. Gray) Wynnewood

An effective fund-raiser and a dynamic leader working for the cure and prevention of cancer, she was a singer of distinction who subordinated what might have been a bright career in music to her lifelong dedication to the effort to control cancer through education and research.

***Rachel Miller Hunt** (Mrs. Roy Arthur Hunt) Pittsburgh

Bibliophile, bibliographer and lecturer, she developed an important collection of botanical books, flower prints, and original botanical drawings, considered one of the best in the world, housed in the Hunt Library at Carnegie Mellon University. She was a director of the Garden Clubs of America and a member of an advisory council of the New York Botanical Gardens.

***Frances McCollin** Philadelphia

A graduate of the Overbrook School for the Blind, she became an outstanding composer of choral and orchestral music, widely performed by the famous orchestras of the United States and Europe. She received many national prizes and awards for musical achievements, lectured in many cities, and conducted radio programs for children.

***The Hon. Sophia M.R. O'Hara, LL.B., J.D.** Kingston

Deputy Attorney General, Secretary of Welfare, and Secretary of the Commonwealth, she also served Pennsylvania as an ex officio member of the State Board of Pardons. She held important legal appointments under six administrations in Pennsylvania and headed a Commission on Interstate Cooperation for Law Enforcement. She was president of the Pennsylvania Council of Republican Women and vice chairman of the State Committee.

***Natalie T. Peace** (Mrs. William S. Peace) Rydal

Chairman of the first committee to develop the Distinguished Daughters of Pennsylvania, an idea she was credited with originating, she shared in the planning for observance of the initial Pennsylvania Week in 1949. She was active in Garden Club work in the Philadelphia area, helped organize the Jenkintown Women's Exchange and the Bulletin Forum and the Bulletin Club Service Bureau for Women. She was the successful chairman of the Eastern Pennsylvania War Finance Division in World War I.

***Ella Roberts, M.D.** Philadelphia

Medical Director of the Children's Heart Hospital, she earned awards and recognition for accomplishments in the medical field, notably the study of rheumatic fever. A Fellow of the American College of Physicians, she received the Award of Merit of the American Medical Society and was awarded the prestigious "Fame Award" for distinguished public service.

***The Hon. Sara M. Soffel, LL.B., J.D.** Pittsburgh

Pennsylvania's first woman jurist, she was active in civic and humanitarian movements and a leader in public life. She was Director of the Bureau of Women and Children in the State Department of Labor and Industry, and served as secretary of the Board of Judges of the Allegheny County Court of Common Pleas.

***Emily Drayton Taylor** (Mrs. J. Madison Taylor) Philadelphia

An artist, a talented painter of miniature portraits, she was a leading spirit in the Miniature Society of America. She painted a portrait of Dr. S. Weir Mitchell in 1893 which was followed by more than 300 later miniature paintings. She was founder and president of the Miniature Society of Pennsylvania, and participated in its Golden Jubilee Exhibition in Philadelphia in 1951, when she was 91 years old.

Appointments for 1952

***The Hon. Anne X. Alpern, LL.B., J.D.** (Mrs. Irwin A. Swiss) Pittsburgh

An attorney, a teacher, city solicitor of Pittsburgh, Attorney General of Pennsylvania and a distinguished judge, she was an early champion of fair utility rates, urban development and slum clearance, showing herself a clear-visioned advocate of the public welfare and an effective leader.

*** Elaine Brown, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Hugh W. Brown) Philadelphia

Founder and director of the "Singing City" project in Philadelphia, she has been a musician of extended interests, involved with the choral activities of Temple University and the Westminster Choir at Princeton, N.J., and other major musical projects, interests and innovations, over a wide area and a long span of time.

***Virginia Wireman Curtin** (Mrs. Thomas J. Curtin) Philadelphia

A noted artist in silver, the first American invited to study silversmithing at Sheffield College in England, she passed the requirements of the Worshipful Company of Goldsmiths, and her work was hallmarked. Descendant of the Richardsons, famous colonial silversmiths of Philadelphia, she made the silver chalice for Old Swedes Church and exhibited at the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

***Esther Minoli Detweiler** (Mrs. Meade D. Detweiler, Jr.) Harrisburg

Auditor and educator, she was Director of the Bureau of Public Assistance Audits for the Auditor General of Pennsylvania and exerted active leadership in politics and numerous civic and public organizations of statewide scope. She was active in the formation of the Distinguished Daughters of Pennsylvania.

***Helen O. Dickens, M.D.** (Mrs. Purvis S. Henderson) Philadelphia

Chief of Obstetrics and Gynecological Services at Mercy Douglas Hospital, she was the first black woman to be named a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, in 1950. The following year, she became a Fellow of the International College of Surgeons.

***Frances Dorrance, Ph.D.** Dallas

Distinguished librarian, translator and historian, she inaugurated state and country-wide archeological research in the culture of the American Indian. She served on the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission and performed outstanding civic services in historic Wyoming Valley.

***Ruth Sprague Downs** (Mrs. S.E. Downs) Narberth

Braille transcriber, Chief of Transcriptions for Volunteer Services for the Blind, she transcribed books of all categories and worked out a code for Amharic, the language of Ethiopia, at a time when blindness was widely prevalent there.

***Ruth Patrick Hodge Van Dusen, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Lewis H. Van Dusen, Jr.) Philadelphia

Head of Limnology at the Academy of Natural Sciences, Philadelphia, she became nationally known as an authority on diatoms, worked on state stream clearance programs and participated in botanical and industrial research on behalf of pure streams.

***Blanche McNeal Smith** (Mrs. Harvey F. Smith) Harrisburg

A leader and initiator of activities in the League of Women Voters, the Harrisburg Symphony Orchestra and Visiting Nurse Association, she also devoted her time and abilities to numerous other civic groups including the Dauphin County Medical Auxiliary.

***Jessie Wright, M.D.** Pittsburgh

A highly-respected physical therapist, Chief of Staff at the D.T. Watson Home for Crippled Children, a training center for physical therapists, she was Director of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh. Consultant to the Surgeon General of the U.S. Army and a researcher in infantile paralysis, arthritis and cerebral palsy, she helped to develop the electronic rocking bed as an alternative to the iron lung.

Appointments for 1953

***Diana Jane Swanton Alter** (Mrs. George E. Alter) Pittsburgh

Director of the first group of Gray Ladies for the American Red Cross, trained in Washington, D.C., at the start of World War II, she worked extensively and effectively for the improvement of health in the community and the state. She was founder of the Heart House at Valencia, Pa.

***Elizabeth Hancock Arnett** (Mrs. William W. Arnett) Philadelphia

An active leader in the fields of music, medicine and religion, she founded the Committee for Young Musicians in Philadelphia. She was an able and dedicated worker for the Philadelphia Orchestra, the University Hospital and Holy Trinity Episcopal Church.

***Margaret Louise Conarroe** Bryn Mawr

As the executive secretary for Emergency Aid in Philadelphia, and its guiding spirit from its founding in 1914, she accomplished many benefits and services for the people of Philadelphia and inspired their extension to communities over the entire state. These projects ranged from the trade school for girls, and Warburton House, a hotel for women, to pioneer aid to polio victims and a Christmas Bazaar for 35 charitable agencies.

***Blanche Wolf Kohn** (Mrs. Isadore Kohn) Philadelphia

Humanitarian and civic leader, she was the founder of the Settlement Music School. She was a self-effacing worker for the Visiting Nurse Society, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Community Chest and numerous other worthy causes.

***Mother Mary Lawrence, S.H.C.J., Ph.D.** Rosemont

President of Rosemont college, and head of the Social Science Department, she was a member of the Community of the Sisters of the Holy Child and venerated as a dedicated educator. Educated at Oxford University, she earned an advanced degree at Fordham University.

***Dorothy Klenke Nash, M.D.** (Mrs. Charles B. Nash) Pittsburgh

Senior surgeon in the Department of Neurosurgery at St. Margaret's Hospital, Pittsburgh, she was an instructor in the School of Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh and associate surgeon in the Department of Neurosurgery at Children's Hospital. Active in many medical and civic associations, she also served as president of the Distinguished Daughters of Pennsylvania.

***Ruth Glenn Pennell** (Mrs. Edred J. Pennell) Mifflintown

Prominent as a political and civic leader, she was involved in the implementation and administration of the merit system for selecting public employee personnel of Pennsylvania. She served in state appointments under three governors and had one of the longest records for continuous employment service for the Commonwealth, at the time of her retirement.

***Marion Margery Scranton** (Mrs. Worthington Scranton) Dalton

A pioneer in political achievement by women, she was a founder of the Pennsylvania Council of Republican Women and served for many years as the National Republican Committeewoman from Pennsylvania. Her son, William W. Scranton, served two terms as Governor of Pennsylvania, and her grandson, another William Scranton, has been Lieut. Governor of the State.

***Eliza Kennedy Smith** (Mrs. R. Templeton Smith) Pittsburgh
President of the Pennsylvania League of Women Voters, heading the Allegheny County League, she served effectively as budget advisor to the Mayor of Pittsburgh and instituted and promoted extensive reforms in tax collection, smoke control, and other public services in Allegheny County.

***Elizabeth Gray Vining** (Mrs. Morgan F. Vining) Philadelphia
Author, teacher, lecturer, tutor to Crown Prince Akihito of Japan, she wrote "Windows for the Crown Prince" and other adult and children's books. She was a winner of the Newbery Medal and received the Japanese Third Order of the Sacred Crown from the government of Japan.

Appointments for 1954

***Anna Calista Clarke, M.D.** Scranton
She was a graduate in medicine, 1890, from the University of Michigan, pursuing further medical studies in New York, Paris and Rome. She served in hospitals in Scranton and Philadelphia, headed the medical department of the Florence Crittenden Mission in Scranton, organized the Red Cross of northeastern Pennsylvania, and was a leader in women's suffrage, BPW, League of Women Voters, Scranton Chamber of Commerce and other organizations.

***Janet DeCoux** Gibsonia
A sculptor of national repute, working in stone and wood, designer of church interiors and monumental works of art, she created the inspiring statue of William Penn in the Penn Memorial Museum at Harrisburg. An expert in the difficult art of bas relief, she designed the medal of the Society of Medalists.

***Mary B. Harris, Ph.D.** Lewisburg
A distinguished expert in the field of women's penal institutions, she earned her outstanding reputation in a quarter of a century of service at the Blackwells Island workhouse in New York, the Reformatory for Women at Clinton, N.J., and the State Home for Girls, Trenton, N.J., and in the design and construction of the revolutionary federal "prison without walls" at Alderson, West Virginia.

***Grace Patricia Kelly** (Princess Grace of Monaco) Philadelphia
At an early age, Grace Kelly was a distinguished and popular star of stage and screen. As the Princess of Monaco after her marriage to Prince Rainier, she served the principality well in a wide range of activities embracing social welfare and cultural opportunities, becoming a genuine humanitarian of international stature.

***Sara Greiner Leffler** (Mrs. Earl J. Leffler) Lebanon
The first woman police reporter on the Philadelphia newspapers, she became active in politics after extensive work with the Red Cross, Civil Defense, and public schools. She served as vice president of the Republican State Committee and devoted more than two decades to service as a Republican County Committee-woman in Philadelphia.

***Virginia Armitage McCall** Ardmore
An artist of distinction, recipient of many honors and prizes, she devoted herself, for an extended period of years, to the role of medical artist at Valley Forge Hospital where she applied her skill and talent to enhancing records and research for medical science.

***Sarah Mellon Scaife** (Mrs. Alan Magee Scaife) Pittsburgh

A philanthropist, whose generous support has been distributed over a varied array of community needs, she has expressed a broad sympathy and concern for the public welfare and exerted effective leadership in such areas as medical progress, health, education and culture.

***Mary Elizabeth Warga, Ph.D.** Pittsburgh

Scientist, educator, researcher, Dr. Warga, professor of Physics in charge of Spectroscopy Laboratories at the University of Pittsburgh, was commissioned by the United States Air Force to visit Italy, France and Belgium to observe their spectroscopy facilities. She performed extensive research in spectro-chemical analysis and studies of the upper atmosphere.

***Helen S. Willard** Philadelphia

A leader in establishing occupational therapy as a recognized profession, she was chairman of the Education Committee of the American Occupational Therapy Association, guided the development of an overall curriculum in the Philadelphia School of Occupational Therapy, and served on several international committees.

***Gertrude Marvin Williams** (Mrs. John Howell) Kingston

A reporter for New York City newspapers, she became a teacher of journalism at Wilkes College where she served as Dean before retiring from her distinguished career in newspaper work and journalism education. She won widespread recognition for research and studies in her field.

Appointments for 1955

***Rae Vickers Biester** (Mrs. William H. Biester, Jr.) Drexel Hill

She was appointed to head the Philadelphia Mint, thus becoming the first woman superintendent of a U. S. mint. National president of the American Legion Auxiliary, she was the first woman president of the Pennsylvania County Treasurers Association, and president of the Philadelphia Federation of Women's Clubs.

***Mamie Geneva Doud Eisenhower** (Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower) Gettysburg

Wife of the 34th President of the United States, she quietly accomplished the first twentieth century redecoration of the White House during her husband's two terms in the presidency. A gracious hostess in Washington, she continued in that role during the Eisenhowers' later years in their home near the battlefield at Gettysburg.

***Marion Spencer Fay, Ph.D.** Philadelphia

Dean of the Women's Medical College, Philadelphia, now the Medical College of Pennsylvania, she contributed importantly to medical progress in her role as Professor of Physiological Chemistry, as a writer, administrator, and educator, whose influence extended over the state and the nation.

***Mary Gibson Henry (Mrs. J. Norman Henry)** Gladwyne

Horticulturist, president of the Henry Foundation for Botanical Research, she made more than ninety expeditions to all parts of the United States and Canada on behalf of major botanical institutions including the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences and the Royal Botanical Society of Edinburgh. She received numerous honors for her contributions to horticulture.

***Ruth Weaver Hubbard, R.N.** Philadelphia

Director of the Visiting Nurses Society, Philadelphia, and president of the National Organization for Public Health Nursing, she led efforts to coordinate health activities and achieved notable results in her committee work on the structure of National Nursing Organizations and National Health Assemblies.

***Emma Guffey Miller (Mrs. Carroll Miller)** Slippery Rock

She was Chairman of the Advisory Board in Pennsylvania for the National Youth Administration. As a delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1924, she became the first woman to receive a vote for President at such a convention. She was a dedicated supporter of the Slippery Rock State College of Pennsylvania and a member of its board of trustees.

***Ruth Crawford Mitchell, Ph.D.** Pittsburgh

Decorated by the governments of Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia for her services overseas with UNRRA, 1944-1946, she devoted herself to fostering international friendship. Seventeen "Nationality Rooms" in the Cathedral of Learning at the University of Pittsburgh testify to her efforts on behalf of international amity. Each room is a gift from a nationality group of the Pittsburgh area.

***Ellen J. Patterson, M.D.** Pittsburgh

Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, and the College of Physicians, she became one of the most distinguished women physicians in Pennsylvania. She served on the staff of seven Pittsburgh hospitals and took an active part in numerous professional organizations. In retirement she directed health services for the Presbyterian Hospital on a volunteer basis.

***Mary Creighton Stackpole (Mrs. Albert H. Stackpole)** Dauphin

A diligent worker for the Red Cross, she held every office of the Harrisburg chapter and served on the Eastern Advisory Board. A member of the Electoral College in 1955, she was the first woman to preside at its sessions. She held posts of leadership in numerous charitable and civic organizations, and was president of the Distinguished Daughters.

***Agnes Lynch Starrett, Litt.D. (Mrs. Clare Vincent Starrett)** Pittsburgh

Professor of English and director of the University Press at the University of Pittsburgh, she wrote the history of "The University Through 150 Years," "The Wild Flowers of Pennsylvania," and other books, distinguishing herself as an author, educator, editor and administrator.

Appointments for 1956

***Gertrude Vaughn Bedford** (Mrs. Paul Bedford) Wilkes-Barre

Active in numerous educational, recreational and welfare organizations, she was the founder, in 1935, of Friends of Shut-Ins Club, out of which grew the Wheelchair Club, Inc. That group has benefitted thousands of handicapped people, inspiring similar clubs in Pennsylvania, other states and abroad. She was the recipient of the Benjamin Rush Award and other honors.

***The Hon. Genevieve Blatt, LLD., J.D.** Pittsburgh

The first woman elected to cabinet rank in public office in Pennsylvania, Judge Blatt has had a distinguished career in public service and the law. Elected Secretary of Internal Affairs, she was named to the Commonwealth Court, and has continued to serve after retirement. Earlier in her career, she was Secretary and chief examiner for the Pittsburgh Civil Service Commission and held other city and state posts.

***Johanna K.W. Hailman** (Mrs. James D. Hailman) Pittsburgh

Horticulturist and artist whose works were exhibited in major galleries, she was awarded the Silver Medal of the Panama-Pacific Exhibition. She worked for improvement of city parks, and for Phipps Conservatory, the largest non-commercial-conservatory in the world.

***Mary Bonaventure McAndrew** Carbondale

An educator for half a century, including twenty years as superintendent of Carbon County Schools, she worked diligently for enactment of the Teacher Tenure Act of 1937. Among her many awards were the gold medal for educational accomplishments from Marywood College, her Alma Mater, and the annual citation of the Pennsylvania Alumnae Association of Washington, D.C.

***Mary Rice Morrow** Camp Hill

Writer and teacher, a pioneer in improving laws affecting working conditions and wages for women and children, she became the director of Pennsylvania's Bureau of Women and Children in the State Department of Labor and Industry. During her incumbency, she achieved major improvements in safeguards for women and children.

***Helen Virginia Stone** Philadelphia

Talented artist and illustrator of children's books, her work has been exhibited in many shows. She received major prizes, including those of the Ringling School of Art in Sarasota, Florida, the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and the Society of American Illustrators. She also held the prestigious Cresson Travelling Scholarship of the Academy.

***Jessie M. Vann** (Mrs. Robert L. Vann) Oakmont

President and treasurer of the Pittsburgh Courier Publishing Co., she was also a civic leader of broad interests. She was the official representative of the United States at the inauguration of President Tubman of Liberia and was decorated by Liberia and Haiti. She received the American Soroptimist Award to Women of Achievement and the American Legion Distinguished Service certificate.

***Nora Waln** (Mrs. George E. Osland-Hill) Philadelphia

Distinguished author and world traveller, she spent her early years in China, where she wrote many poems, short stories and her famous novels, "The House of Exile" and "Reaching for the Stars." Doing relief work for child victims of World War II in England, France and Norway, Japan, India and Korea, she was attached to the headquarters of General MacArthur.

Appointments for 1957

***Helen C. Bailey, LL.D., Ed.D.** Philadelphia

A distinguished educator, she served as teacher, principal, district superintendent and associate superintendent in the school district of Philadelphia, playing a dynamic role in public education and receiving many honors and awards for her accomplishments.

***Catherine Drinker Bowen** (Mrs. Thomas McKeen Downs) Bryn Mawr

Famous for her historical writings on law and jurisprudence, she wrote biographies of Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, John Adams and Sir Edward Coke. Her "Miracle in Philadelphia" is an outstanding work on the making of the U.S. Constitution. An accomplished violinist, she played frequently with string quartets in Philadelphia and New York.

***Annette Evans** Wilkes-Barre

Founder of the Wilkes-Barre Philharmonic Society and co-founder of the Wilkes-Barre Little Theater, which she served as executive director, she was active in music, drama and literature, and did statewide research in Indian archeology. She wrote a biography of George Catlin, Wilkes-Barre native, famous painter of the American Indian.

***The Hon. Ruth Grigg Horting, L.H.D.** (Mrs. John F. Horting) Lancaster

Secretary of the Department of Health and Welfare in Governor Leader's cabinet, she was the first woman from Lancaster County elected to the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, after an earlier career in public life and service to the Lutheran Church, locally and nationally.

***The Hon. Marian E. Markley** (Mrs. Franklin H. Markley) Macungie

A member of the Legislature for several terms, she had served previously as secretary to the majority leader of the House and as administrative assistant to the speaker. As a legislator, she was chairman of the Committee on Education. She worked successfully for laws providing day care and training centers for retarded and handicapped children.

***Irene E. McDermott** Pittsburgh

The distinguished director of Home Economics education in the public schools of Pittsburgh for many years, she was the author of several textbooks and a leader of new trends in Home Economics instruction at local, state and national levels.

***Sister Martha Pretzlaff** Pittsburgh

A deaconess graduate of the Lutheran Mother house in Milwaukee, she devoted forty years to the Passavant Hospital as director of nursing and hospital administrator, extending her concern to the needs of people in the depressed area of Pittsburgh adjacent to the hospital.

***Rachel Mulford Winlock, M.D.**

Philadelphia

A psychiatrist, she was the director of the Lehigh Valley Guidance Clinic, operating in Bethlehem and Allentown, and served on the staff of the Wernersville State Hospital. As Medical Director of the Philadelphia Child Health Society, she helped bring the Pennsylvania Mass Nutrition Studies to Philadelphia and made the first survey of psychiatric needs and resources for children of the area.

Appointments for 1958

***Marian Anderson (Mrs. Orpheus Fisher)**

Philadelphia

Internationally famous singer and humanitarian, she made a concert tour of Far Eastern countries for the United States State Department. She was a delegate to the United Nations by appointment of President Eisenhower. A recipient of the Philadelphia award, she set up the Marian Anderson Scholarship. Her many honors include highest awards from the governments of Sweden and Finland.

***The Hon. Hazel Brown, LL.B., J.D.**

Philadelphia

The first woman judge in Philadelphia, who also served as President Judge of the Philadelphia Municipal Courts, she held the post of assistant district attorney, was appointed district attorney and elected to a full ten-year term, before ascending to the bench. She worked untiringly for the welfare of young people and the needy of her community.

***Kathleen Derrigan Bryne, Ph.D. (Mrs Herbert F. Bryne)**

Pittsburgh

Educator, scholar, author, an authority on the life and works of Willa Cather, she achieved national eminence in semantics and linguistics. Active in welfare work, she was also president of the Board of Seton Hill College; the Pittsburgh Child Guidance Center; the United Mental Health Association and a member of a number of other boards. An honorary degree of Doctor of Laws is among the many honors and awards she has received.

***Marguerite Lofft deAngeli (Mrs. John deAngeli)**

Philadelphia

Author and illustrator of children's books, she has been the recipient of numerous awards, recognitions and honors, including the Newbery Medal, the Regina Medal, the Drexel Citation, the Juliette Low Award and the citation of the Association for Graphic Arts for illustrations exhibited at the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

***Mother Anna Marie Dengel, M.D.**

Philadelphia

Founder and Superior General of the Medical Mission Sisters, she directed the worldwide work of the order. Born and educated in Austria, she studied medicine and received her medical degree in Ireland. Before coming to the United States, she had been Chief Physician at a Pakistani hospital for women and children. She established the Catholic Medical Missionaries to serve in undeveloped areas of the world.

***Ann Hawkes Hutton, LL.B., J.D. (Mrs. L.J. Hutton)**

Bristol

Honored author-historian, playwright, speaker and preservationist, appointed by 11 governors to the Washington Crossing Park Commission, she has given 47 years of volunteer service, a commonwealth record, and is current chairman. She has also served on two Presidential Commissions. Past president of Historic Fallsington, Inc. and of the Distinguished Daughters, she now heads the Historical Foundation of Pennsylvania and the Washington Crossing Foundation.

***Florence Lillian Marcus, M.D.**

Pittsburgh

A leader in preventive medicine who became a doctor after her experience as a nurse, she practiced medicine in Philadelphia, Alaska and Pittsburgh, where she directed the Arsenal Health Center and started the Modern Child Health Conference. She helped write Commonwealth laws on adoption and other legislation affecting the standards of home care for children.

***Elizabeth Nesbitt**

Pittsburgh

Educator, author, librarian, associate dean of the Library School of Carnegie Institute of Technology, she was elected president of the Children's Division of the American Library Association. An internationally-known authority on children's literature, and a scholar on folklore, epics and sagas, she was chairman of the Newbery-Caldecot Awards and wrote the final, critical chapter of the book about them.

***Dorothea Wielland Sitley**

Philadelphia

Director of the Women's Club Center in Philadelphia, she integrated the work of women's clubs and was associated with every major welfare and civic group in Philadelphia. She has received recognition and citations from a wide variety of national, state and Philadelphia institutions, ranging from Outstanding Woman of Philadelphia to the U.S. Treasury Citation for Savings Bonds Services.

***Marjorie Allison**

Allentown

Banker and businesswoman, leader in educational and cultural activities for handicapped children, she combined a successful business career with significant contributions to community life. Chairman of the Board of the Swain Country Day School, she helped to win national interest for the Children's Theater School and the Civic Little Theater at Allentown.

***Rachel Ashe, M.D.**

Philadelphia

A pediatric cardiologist who played an important role in development of new techniques, she gave years of productive service to the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. Among her many citations is that of the Alumnae Association of the Woman's Medical College for the distinction she reflected on her alma mater and on women in medicine.

***Mary Arnold Babcock (Mrs. Edward Vose Babcock)**

Pittsburgh

An effective civic leader in educational, recreational, and cultural activities, especially for young people, she also gave notable service in patriotic endeavors in World War I. The Girl Scout movement, the Fresh Air Home Committee, the Ellis School, the Pittsburgh Symphony, and the University of Pittsburgh, are among the beneficiaries of her public interest.

***Mary Flinn Lawrence (Mrs. John W. Lawrence)**

Pittsburgh

Politically active in conservation, reforestation, economic and social needs of Pennsylvania, she served under Governor Pinchot as vice chairman of the Commission for the Study of Pennsylvania Statutes pertaining to children, one of the many areas in which she made valuable contributions.

*** Emily Hartshorne Mudd, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Frederick H. Gloeckner) Haverford
Author and marriage counselor, she became known all over the world for the development of a practical program for the Philadelphia Marriage Council which she served as executive director. Professor of Family Studies in Psychiatry at the University of Pennsylvania, she is the author of many books and articles in her field.

***Mary Hamilton Swindler, Ph.D.** Bryn Mawr
Archeologist, scholar, author, and teacher, she performed research and exploration in the United States and abroad. As a professor of classical archeology at Bryn Mawr College and participant in the work of the American School of Classical Studies in Athens, she continued research and writing as visiting professor at the University of Pennsylvania, in Michigan and at Bryn Mawr.

***The Hon. Mary A. Varallo** (Mrs. Alfred Varallo) Philadelphia
A Democratic member of the City Council of Philadelphia and a state legislator at Harrisburg, she paid unflagging attention to the welfare of children. She initiated important legislation such as the first law granting equal rights to women (1945), became dean of the women members in the House of Representatives and served as Majority Whip.

***Jean Hastings West** (Mrs. George L. West) Pittsburgh
A community-minded leader with a particular interest in the welfare of children, she served on the Governor's Committee on Child Welfare and contributed to the activities of the National Board of Child and Family Service and the National Council of Social Work. President of the Board of the YWCA in Pittsburgh and a member of the national board, she gave that organization energetic and forceful leadership.

*** Sara Wolfe Bell** (Mrs. George Thompson Bell) Wilkes-Barre
A student of the deficiencies and needs in the Commonwealth program for dependent children, she devoted many years to obtaining new laws, supported by adequate budgets. The only woman member of the Wilkes-Barre Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, she received the Pennsylvania Citizen's Association Award for outstanding citizenship and served as president of the Distinguished Daughters.

***Dorothy Grafly** (Mrs. Charles H. Drummond) Philadelphia
Art critic, writer, feature editor, she wrote the "History of the Philadelphia Print Club, Parade of American Art" and "Tales of Living European Sculptors." Born in Paris, she became editor and publisher of *Art in Focus*, a periodical devoted to art, artists and exhibits.

*** Ruth Wright Hayre, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Talmadge B. Hayre) Broomall
Vice principal and principal of the William Penn High School, Philadelphia, where she initiated a stimulating "Wings to Excellence" program, she also worked on many civic enterprises, concentrating on efforts to prevent juvenile delinquency.

***Eleanor Park Kelly** Pittsburgh

An outstanding and civic-minded business executive, she headed the George A. Kelly Company, the largest wholesale drug firm in a three-state area, for many years. She earned the respect of her business colleagues and effectively demonstrated a responsible attitude toward her employees and the community.

*** Helen Taft Manning** (Mrs. Frederick J. Manning) Haverford

The daughter of President William Howard Taft, she began her career as academic dean at Bryn Mawr College, becoming a widely recognized administrator and historian. As the Goodhart Professor of History, she made valuable contributions to the history of the British Empire and French Colonial nationalism. She was the first woman appointed to the governing board of the American Historical Society.

*** Mary Louise Milligan, Col. U.S. Army** (Mrs. Elmer E. Rasmuson) Pittsburgh

Born and educated in Pittsburgh, she was a teacher and assistant supervising principal in the Pittsburgh schools before her enlistment in the first Officer Candidate Class of the Women's Army Corps. During World War II, she rose to the highest rank open to a woman in the U.S. Army, and became director of the Women's Army Corps. For almost four years she was WAC Staff Adviser to the Commander-in-Chief in Europe.

***Edna Phillips Rosenbaum** (Mrs. Samuel R. Rosenbaum) Philadelphia

A musician, harpist and teacher, she played the harp with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra with such distinction that many works were written for and dedicated to her. She headed the Harp Department of the Philadelphia Conservatory of Music, and was teacher, guide and counselor to many young musicians. She devoted much energy, time and knowledge to the task of introducing good music in the schools.

***Jennie Bradley Roessing** Pittsburgh

Pioneer feminist who served as president of the Pennsylvania Women's Suffrage Association, she was first vice president of the national Woman's Suffrage Movement, working and lobbying to obtain for American women the right to vote. She was an active proponent of an independent juvenile court for Allegheny County.

***Mabel Ammons Barron, R.N.** Ellwood City

Hospital administrator, leader in state and national professional associations, she was one of the first women to serve the Hospital Association of Pennsylvania as president, and was also the first woman president of the Middle Atlantic Hospital Assembly. She was a long-time treasurer of the Distinguished Daughters.

*** Henrietta Titzel Campbell** (Mrs. Robert D. Campbell) Pittsburgh

President of Allegheny County YWCA, a member of the National Board and its International Division, she also became a member of the Board of Christian Education of the Presbyterian Church of the United States and a trustee of Chatham College and Wells College.

***Eleanor Jane Carlin, Brig. Gen. U.S. Army (Ret.)** **Jenkintown**

A physiotherapist who served as consultant to the Surgeon General of the U.S. Air Force and saw active duty during the Second World War with the U.S. Army in the Philippines, she rose to the rank of Brigadier General. Actively associated with the Division of Physical Therapy at the University of Pennsylvania, she served as president of the National Physical Therapy Association. She is a trustee of Beaver College.

***The Hon. Kathryn E. Granahan (Mrs. William T. Granahan)** **Philadelphia**

The only woman elected to the U.S. Congress from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania when she began her long term of service as representative of Philadelphia's Second Congressional District, she promoted legislation affecting the economy of major cities and controlling use of the mails for pornographic material. She was Chairman of the Subcommittee of the House Committee on Post Office and Civil Service Affairs.

***Isabella J. Jones** **Pittsburgh**

A distinguished journalist, she served the Commonwealth as Deputy Secretary of Welfare and went to Germany to consult on welfare matters as a representative of the federal government. She was Director of the National Committee for Children and Youth and served as Associate Director of Planning for the 1960 White House Conference.

***Gladys Schmitt (Mrs. Simon Goldfield)** **Pittsburgh**

Author, teacher, professor of English at Carnegie Institute of Technology, she also served in the Drama Department of the School of Fine Arts and wrote a number of works of fiction including "Rembrandt," the third of her novels selected by the Literary Guild.

***Dora F. Capwell, Ph.D.** **Pittsburgh**

Director of psychological services of Pittsburgh, she was the first woman licensed as a psychologist in Pennsylvania and the first in the nation to direct the operations of an important psychological service. She came to Pittsburgh from the Minnesota Bureau of Psychological Service during World War II, to direct the Trainee Acceptance Service. She served as president of the Pennsylvania Psychological Association. She was also an accomplished violinist.

***Dorothy Dickson Darte (Mrs. Franck G. Darte)** **Wilkes-Barre**

A preservationist and philanthropist, she gave Swetland Homestead as a historic house museum to her community and remodeled the Caroline E. Pettebone Gymnasium at the Wyoming Seminary into a student center and theater, among numerous other educational and historical contributions of major importance.

***Helen Clay Frick** **Pittsburgh**

She enhanced and perpetuated many memorials to her father, Henry Clay Frick. She expressed her concern for historic preservation and philanthropy as a member of the Frick Education Committee, awarding scholarships to teachers, and donated the Henry Clay Frick Fine Arts Building to the University of Pittsburgh to house the Frick Fine Arts Library and the Lochoff Art Collection.

***Margaret Majer Kelly** (Mrs. John Brendan Kelly) Philadelphia

A teacher of physical education at both high school and college levels, she advocated physical fitness for all youth. She believed firmly in the necessity for training women doctors. A member of the Board of Trustees of Women's Medical College, she also served on the Philadelphia Board of Public Education. She is the mother of the late Princess Grace of Monaco, and the late John B. Kelly, Jr.

***Ada Haeseler Lewis** (Mrs. John Frederick Lewis, Jr.) Philadelphia

Educator, Associate Trustee of the University of Pennsylvania and member of its Board of Humanistic Studies, she served for more than 30 years on the Philadelphia Board of Public Education and was a member of the Board of Directors of the Philadelphia Child Guidance Clinic and the Social Service Committee of the University of Pennsylvania Hospital.

***Gertrude Olmstead Nauman** (Mrs. Spencer Gilbert Nauman) Harrisburg

A diligent worker and leader in state and national civic affairs, she was the first president of the Junior League of Harrisburg and first chairman of the Children's Diagnostic Center. Before women were admitted to the study of architecture at the University of Pennsylvania, she attended all the classes and qualified for the degree of Bachelor of Fine Arts.

Appointments for 1963

***Dorothy Kenworthy Anderson** Philadelphia

In spite of her loss of sight while a college student, she completed her education with distinction. She served as Music Director of the Dodge Community Center in Detroit, Michigan, and came to Pennsylvania as supervisor of Home Teaching for the Blind for the Department of Welfare in Harrisburg. Later she supervised the Philadelphia office, largest of the six district offices in the state.

***Lucille Breeding Crozier** (Mrs. Alfred W. Crozier) Pittsburgh

She was a leader in the Pennsylvania State Branch of the AAUW, the Auxiliary of the Pennsylvania Medical Society, and the Alumni Association of the University of Pittsburgh. She was chairman of the Curriculum Committee on Governor Lawrence's Commission for Education and served the Distinguished Daughters as president.

***Hilda Vogel Fox** (Mrs. Cyril G. Fox) Media

Organizer of a Pennsylvania chapter of Friends of the Land, she was one of the founders and long-time president of the Pennsylvania Roadside Council. She served on the board of the Visiting Nurses Association of Pennsylvania and worked with the Federation of Garden Clubs and Keep America Beautiful, Inc., the State Departments of Commerce and Highways and the State Planning Board.

***Sara Henderson Hay** (Mrs. Nikolai Lopatnikoff) Pittsburgh

A poet of international reputation, she was an editor of the Rare Book Department of Charles Scribner & Sons and is a respected literary critic. She served as a director of the Women's Association of the Pittsburgh Symphony Society.

***Eleanor Gangloff Morris, M.D.** (Mrs. Frederick S. Morris) Jones Mills

Director of the Indian Creek Valley Child Health Center, she also established a community library, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Brownies, a baseball team, an ice skating rink and a youth recreation center. She holds awards for distinguished service to Chatham College, the Commonwealth Committee of the Woman's Medical College, and other groups.

***Mildred Fairchild Woodbury, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Robert Morse Woodbury)

Bryn Mawr

Author of many valuable reports on public welfare, she was chairman of the U.S. Committee for the International Conference on Social Work and served on the Board of Trustees of the National Child Labor Committee. She was director of the Graduate Department of Social Economy at Bryn Mawr College and chief of the Division of Women and Young Persons of the International Labor Office.

***Rebecca F. Gross, Cdr. U.S.N.R. (Ret.)**

Lock Haven

Editor of The Lock Haven Express for 40 years, a journalist for 45, she was active in newspaper organizations on the state and national levels. She was a member of advisory boards for the State Departments of Health, Welfare and Education and now serves on the Board of Governors for the State System of Higher Education. She has been a Nieman Fellow at Harvard University and, during World War II served as a WAVES officer in the U.S. Navy.

***Florence S. Reizenstein** (Mrs. Louis J. Reizenstein)

Pittsburgh

An effective educator and a pioneer in group relations, she served on the Executive Board of the Urban League and the Mayor's Commission on Human Relations in Pittsburgh, the Pennsylvania State Commission on Human Relations and the National Conference of Christians and Jews. She also served as president of the Pittsburgh United Nations Association.

***Helen Pool Rush, Ph.D.**

Pittsburgh

Educator and lecturer, Dean of Women and Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs at the University of Pittsburgh, she was president of the Pennsylvania Association of Women Deans and Councilors. She received the Winifred Cullis Fellowship of the American Association of Deans and Councilors followed by a lecture tour in England. Her 50 years of service to the University were recognized with a special award.

***Anna Estes Hacker Strawbridge** (Mrs. Francis B. Strawbridge)

Philadelphia

A poet, and a social and civic leader of varied interests and broad concerns, she was instrumental in the preservation of community values and traditions over a period of more than eight decades. President of the National Organization of the Colonial Dames of America and their organization in the Commonwealth, she served long and faithfully with a score of public-spirited organizations.

***Katherine R. Boucot Sturgis, M.D.** (Mrs. Samuel Sturgis)

Philadelphia

Director of the Philadelphia Tuberculosis and Health Association, chairman of the Department of Preventive Medicine and Clinical Professor of Medicine at Women's Medical College, she was the first full-time woman professor on the faculty. A physician and surgeon of wide reputation, she received the Elizabeth Blackwell award for her work for public health and control of tuberculosis, among other outstanding recognitions and awards.

***Bernice McIlhenny Wintersteen** (Mrs. John Wintersteen) Villanova

President of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, the first woman to serve in that capacity, she also has been president of the Print Club of Philadelphia and the Moore College of Art, and the first woman on the Advisory Council of the Princeton Museum of Art. Lecturer on art, owner of a distinguished collection of paintings, also active in musical circles, she was co-chairman of the 103rd Anniversary concert and ball of the Academy of Music, and held numerous awards, honorary degrees and posts of other civic and cultural responsibility.

***The Hon. Mary Thompson Denman, LL.D., J.D.** (Mrs. David N. Denman)
Pittsburgh

As a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature in the House of Representatives, she prepared the first Public Welfare Code and formulated other legislation to meet the needs of citizens. After World War II, she worked with the United States Committee for the care of European children.

***Sophie Hutchinson Drinker** (Mrs. Henry S. Drinker) Philadelphia

Musician, scholar, author, a volunteer with varied interests, she wrote "Women and Music" and other books mostly portraying women. Holder of an honorary degree from Smith College for her research, she fostered charitable, civic, and cultural activities of broad scope.

***Etta Oberholtzer Engle** (Mrs. Roy W. Engle) Harrisburg

A teacher in the public schools who later served on local, state and national boards relating to education, mental health, library and welfare work, Red Cross and other public service, she headed the Pennsylvania Division of AAUW and received the Benjamin Rush Award from the Dauphin County Medical Society.

***Lillian A. Friedberg** (Mrs. Emmanuel B. Friedberg) Pittsburgh

An educator and an effective administrator on the Jewish Community Relations Council for 22 years, she was active in the support of the United Nations and the Immigration and Naturalization Committee and produced TV programs on behalf of interfaith understanding.

***Kathryn Noros Haas** (Mrs. Stephen Haas) Philadelphia

A dedicated volunteer whose concerns included recruiting WACS and selling war Bonds in World War II and working with CARE from its beginning in 1946, she was active with the Save the Children Federation and on committees supporting the Women's Medical College of Pennsylvania.

***Margaret Colton Hand** (Mrs. Bayard Hand) Wilkes-Barre

A dedicated pioneer advocate of better government and higher community standards, she was a leader in the community welfare federation, now the Wyoming United Fund, and an organizer of the USO and Civil Defense activity in World War II. She founded the League of Women Voters and spearheaded the United Nations Organization in Wilkes-Barre.

* **Constance Reynolds Belin** (Mrs. C. Welles Belin) Waverly

Founder, leader, and officer or board member of the Welfare Council of Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania Council, Junior League of Scranton, the Visiting Nurse Association of Pennsylvania, the National League of Nursing, and other groups, she also worked assiduously with the Wyoming Historical and Geographical Society.

* **Helen E. Heydrick** (Mrs. William J. Heydrick) Philadelphia

Family counselor and religious worker, active in local government, she was the only woman member of the Philadelphia Charter Commission. She directed the Community Services Department of the Greater Philadelphia Council of Churches, was a leader in the interchurch programs for child care and the Philadelphia Center for Older People, and a well-known and popular speaker.

* **The Hon. Caryl Morse Kline** (Mrs. Hibbard V. Kline, Jr.) Pittsburgh

Educator and lecturer, she was Special Assistant to the Chancellor of the University of Pittsburgh, in the field of education for older women. She served on the Board of State College and University Directors and as State Secretary of Education. In West Africa, she was Special Ambassador from the United States when Sierra Leone celebrated its independence. She was chairman of the board of the Federal Home Loan Bank, Third District.

* **Marion Willis Martin Revinus** (Mrs. Edward Florens Revinus) Philadelphia

Horticulturist, historian, lecturer, author of historical books and magazine articles including contributions to the National Geographic, donating proceeds to historical organizations, she served on the Pennsylvania and National Councils of the American Youth Hostels and was nationally active in conservation and garden clubs.

* **Sarah Ann Stauffer** Rohrerstown

A leader in politics and many civic and welfare organizations, she was an administrator for the Munitions Division in the Aircraft Department of the Armstrong Cork Company early in World War II and later directed 350 American Red Cross Clubmobiles in U.S. Occupied Territory in Europe. She established the Lancaster County Homemakers' Service and served on the Republican State and National Executive Committees.

* **Eugenia Fuller Atwood** (Mrs. John C. Atwood, Jr.) Philadelphia

Teacher, nurse, philanthropist and scholar, she served with the American Hospital in Paris in World War I and was chairman of Red Cross activities at home during World War II. She was an instructor in the history of architecture at the University of Washington, Seattle. Vice president of the Beaver College Board of Trustees, she gave a library and a Little Theater to the college.

* **Catharine Palmer Craig** (Mrs. Paul C. Craig) Wyomissing

Civic leader and author, she was president of the Women's Auxiliary of county, state and national medical associations. The first woman on the Advisory Board of the Berks Center of Pennsylvania State University, she received awards from the United Way and AAUW and has been a leader in homemaking service. She holds an honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities from Albright College.

***Blanche Galey Alexander** (Mrs. James Alexander) Somerset

An artist and a politically active citizen, she served on the Pennsylvania Electoral College in 1952 and as president of the Women's Committee of the Carnegie Museum of Art. She holds numerous awards for painting and sculpture, and was on the National Defense Advisory Committee for women in the military service.

* **Alice Gertrude Renfrew, Ph.D.** Pittsburgh

Renowned teacher, scientific research scholar, and a distinguished chemist, she taught organic chemistry at the Mellon Institute. Collaborating with colleagues, she helped develop and test medicinal "Compound 71" to combat the deadly pneumococcus bacteria, and did research on kidney disease and on derivatives of quinine to fight malaria. She translated and coded publications from Russian technical journals.

* **Constance Cann Wolf** (Mrs. Alfred L. Wolf) Blue Bell

An aviator and balloonist, she broke fifteen world records for free flight in a balloon in 1961, and was the first woman to fly a balloon over the Alps. She and her husband were jointly honored by the Geographical Society as the most famous pair in aviation. She was a consultant on the film "Around the World in Eighty Days."

***Ernesta Drinker Ballard** (Mrs. Frederick L. Ballard) Philadelphia

Horticulturist and lecturer, she was director of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, active in the national associations of botanical gardens and arboreta, the Garden Writers, and the American Horticultural Society, attending international meetings and receiving many honors.

***Lucille Madison Cuthbert** (Mrs. William M. Cuthbert) Verona

Widely known speaker and civic leader with the local and the national YWCA, she served on the national board for 22 years. She has concerned herself with many other civic and civil rights organizations. She served the Distinguished Daughters as secretary.

* **Gertrude Sumner Ely** Bryn Mawr

Humanitarian and civic leader, she was twice given the Croix de Guerre for work in France during World War I. After World War II she was assigned to German refugee camps by the International Refugee Organization. During the Depression she headed the women's division of the Works Progress Administration and later was an active worker on the National Board of the U.S. Committee for UNICEF, and a founder of the Greater Philadelphia Committee.

***Elizabeth Murphy Greenfield Petrie** (Mrs. Donald A. Petrie) Philadelphia

Dedicated to improving education, she was a member of the Philadelphia Board of Education, working on the "Greenfield Report." Vice chairman of the Great Cities Program for School Improvement, member of the National Advisory Council of the Peace Corps and the U.S. Committee for the United Nations, she represented the State Department on an educational mission to the Orient.

***The Hon. Jeannette F. Reibman, LL.B., J.D.** (Mrs. Nathan L. Reibman) Easton

A Democratic member of the Pennsylvania State Senate since the mid-1960s, after serving five terms in the House of Representatives, she headed the Committee on Education in both Houses and has sponsored major educational legislation and the Master Plan for Higher Education. An attorney and public-spirited citizen, she is widely respected as a legislator and civic leader.

***Wyonia Faulkner Wagner** (Mrs. John M. Wagner) Clarks Summit

A registered nurse, who served as Director of Nursing at the Moses Taylor Hospital in Scranton, she has been president of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Medical Society of Pennsylvania, editor of the magazine of the Woman's Auxiliary of the American Medical Association, and president of the National Council of Homemaker Services.

***Maxine Goldmark Aaron** (Mrs. Marcus Lester Aaron) Pittsburgh

An educator, deeply interested in music, child guidance, Juvenile Court, family planning and community action, she was a long-time member of the Pittsburgh School Board, which elected her president in 1966, crowning her record of faithful service on the board for eighteen years.

***Louise Graham Brown** (Mrs. Earle A. Brown) Pittsburgh

An active worker in many organizations and civic activities, she served as president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, one of the largest organizations of its kind in the world. Her local interests have emphasized education and health, among numerous other community services.

***Carolyn Haywood** Philadelphia

A portrait painter and calligrapher, she won distinction as a painter of children and murals as well as for hand-lettering and illuminating. An outstanding author and illustrator of more than forty children's books, her works have been translated into several European languages and were widely used in radio broadcasts.

***Virginia Harrington Knauer** (Mrs. Wilhelm F. Knauer) Philadelphia

A graduate of Women's Medical College, she was active in the work of the medical societies of her county and the state, serving as an official delegate and becoming the first woman elected vice president of the American Medical Association. She was Stated Clerk of the Quaker Meeting of Plymouth Meeting.

* **Margaret Hodges** (Mrs. Fletcher Hodges) Pittsburgh

Writer, librarian, teacher and a popular television and radio personality, her broadcasts over the Educational Networks won nation-wide recognition and her books for children, of adventure, history and travel, are widely read. She was the author of a Caldecott Award book.

* **Constance Mellon Burrell** (Mrs. Peter Burrell) Ligonier

A woman of wide interests in the arts, education and sports, she took a keen delight in the embellishment of the Executive Mansion of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, serving as chairman of the Women's Advisory Committee for the official residence of Pennsylvania Governors.

* **Claire Spencer Spackman** Philadelphia

A distinguished physical therapist, she was director of Clinical Practice and Associate Professor of Occupational Therapy at the University of Pennsylvania and her influence has been reflected in the development of the profession of physical therapy throughout the nation and the world. She served as treasurer of the Distinguished Daughters.

Mildred Miller Posvar (Mrs. Wesley Wents Posvar) Pittsburgh

A mezzo soprano who sang at the Metropolitan Opera House in New York and with many European opera companies, she has served on the boards of most of Pittsburgh's musical organizations and is actively interested in the work of the University of Pittsburgh.

Barbara L. Weisberger (Mrs. Ernest Weisberger) Kingston

Founder of the Pennsylvania Ballet, she has been interested in dance from her early years as a grade school teacher and has devoted time, talent and energy to making the Pennsylvania Ballet an outstanding organization in the nation, widely recognized abroad.

A diligent worker for community centers, day nursery, recreation, United Fund, the Philadelphia Zoological Gardens and other institutions, she was a delegate on the trip of the Philadelphia Orchestra to China and Europe.

Elsie Hilliard Hillman

Pittsburgh

A community leader whose activities have embraced culture, social services, community welfare and political leadership, she has earned wide respect and distinction. A director of WQED, educational television, she was chairman of its first auction. A trustee of Carlow College, and chairman of the Board of Westminster Choir College in Princeton, she has served as National Republican Committeewoman from Pennsylvania.

***Barbara D. Hoffstot** (Mrs. Henry P. Hoffstot, Jr.)

Pittsburgh

Historian and author, she was one of the founders of the Pittsburgh History and Landmark Foundation and participated in its extensive program of restoration and preservation. A member of the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission, she served on the board of the National Trust for Historic Preservation and as convener of the National Trust for Scotland. ***Martha A. Gable** Philadelphia

Pioneer in educational TV, she spent years as a teacher and director of radio-TV for the Philadelphia public schools. Consultant to the American Association of School Administrators, Washington, D.C. and editor of its publication, she was a judge of women's gymnastics for five Olympic Games and contributed to Museum Showcase, which attracts visitors to museums and historic houses in greater Philadelphia.

Alice Belew Lonsdorf (Mrs. Richard G. Lonsdorf) Narberth

Founder of the Friends of Independence National Historical Park, she has been chairman, board member and advisor. She has served as chairman of Philadelphia Open House, secretary of the Women's Committee of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and worked for organizations promoting preservation of Philadelphia's historic past. She served as assistant dean of the University of Pennsylvania Law School.

***Marion Shulman Maazel** (Mrs. Lincoln Maazel) Pittsburgh

A musician herself and wife and mother of musicians, she is managing director of the Pittsburgh Youth Symphony, which she took on a barge tour of 21 cities abroad, receiving national and international recognition, including the coveted ASCAP Award. She is a board member of the Women's Association of Pittsburgh Symphony Society and the Pittsburgh Chamber Music Society.

***Cynthia Shallcross Calhoun** (Mrs. Ernest N. Calhoun) Pittsburgh

One of the founding members of the Pennsylvania Council, Inc., she was named "Conservationist of the Year" in 1981 by the Pennsylvania Environmental Council. First woman appointed to membership, and elected president and director of the National Board of Medical Examiners, she is a member of many national medical and health organizations and international committees. A Master of the American College of Physicians and a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences, she also served on the Boards of the Philadelphia Electric Co. and Germantown Savings Bank.

***Jane M. Oppenheimer, Ph.D.** Bryn Mawr

Professor Emeritus of Biology and History of Science at Bryn Mawr College, she has had a notable career in the field of biological and space research. She has held prestigious research fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation and Yale University, the University of Rochester, and the National Science Foundation. She conducted crucial experiments connected with the Space Missions of NASA in the early 1970s.

The Hon. Madaline Palladino, LL.B., J.D. Allentown

She had been a practicing lawyer in Allentown for three decades when she was appointed to the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania in 1960 and later elected to a full term. She was the only woman appointed to the Civil Procedural Rules Committee by the Supreme Court. She is involved in many civic activities including the Advisory Board of the League of Women Voters, and the governing boards of three colleges.

***Caroline Robbins, Ph.D.** (Mrs. Stephen J. Herben) Rosemont

An authority on William Penn, she initiated the Penn Project of the Tercentenary Celebration of the Commonwealth. She is the author of many books and articles on historical subjects, and has received numerous honors from historical societies in this country and Great Britain. She is Professor Emeritus of Bryn Mawr College and holds the Lindbach Award for distinguished teaching.

The Hon. Alma Rau Jacobs (Mrs. J. Alexander Jacobs) Blue Bell

Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Aging, chairman of the Pennsylvania Commission for Women, and Women for Greater Philadelphia, and a former executive of Bell of Pennsylvania, she was treasurer of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women. She was a delegate to the conference of the National Association of Commissions for Women, and to the 1976 Republican National Convention.

Margy Ellin Meyerson (Mrs. Martin Meyerson) Philadelphia

Sociologist and urbanist, who taught at the University of California at Berkeley, she was a consultant to the United Nations, several universities and private businesses. Author of articles and a book on urban housing, she has been an officer of the Rosenbach Museum and Library, the Philadelphia City Planning Commission, the Lewis Stevens Community Trust and has served other cultural organizations, including those connected with the University of Pennsylvania.

Mary Hamilton Purcell (Mrs. William Purcell) Wallingford

President of the national AAUW and a member of its international Council in Geneva, Switzerland, she has spoken widely on the issues that constitute a women's bill of rights. She has been chairman of the Juvenile Justice Task Force for the Philadelphia Citizens Crime Commission. A communications professional, she has taught at Temple University and Cushing Junior College.

*** Savina Stark Skewis** Pittsburgh

An educator in nutrition and home economics, she has served as Dean of Women, Dean of Students, and consultant to the Secretary of the University of Pittsburgh. She traveled extensively in France with the University Heinz Chapel Choir and developed a unique extra-curricular program relating to the life pattern of families in which husband and wife both hold full-time jobs.

*** Lula Mays Witherow** (Mrs. Frederick K. Witherow) State College

A member of the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission and a trustee of the Washington Crossing Foundation, she has had a long career in education, public service and civic affairs. She was a delegate to several Republican National Conventions and served on the board of the Pennsylvania Council of Republican Women after filling the post of president.

Sondra Myers (Mrs. Morey Myers) Scranton

Recognized nationally for her leadership in the arts, humanities and education, she has played a major role in economic development in northeastern Pennsylvania, and in the social welfare of inner city youth. She has given energetic inspiration to organizations supporting arts, music and cultural affairs. Her efforts have been recognized by major awards.

***Louise Pershing** Pittsburgh

Painter, sculptor, designer, and founder of the Pittsburgh Center for the Arts, she established contemporary art galleries in Pittsburgh and New Hope. Her fascination with the subject matter of industry is reflected in paintings and sculptures portraying machines. Her work has been exhibited widely, is owned by many museums, galleries, art centers and corporations, and has earned many major recognitions.

***Corinne M. Barnes, R.N., Ph.D., F.A.A.N.** Pittsburgh

A woman of many "firsts" in Ophthalmology, she was one of two women graduates in her class at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine and the first woman resident in her field at the Pittsburgh Eye and Ear Hospital. She was also the first woman president of the Pittsburgh Ophthalmology Society, St. Francis Hospital and the Medical Alumni Association of the University. She has earned national and international renown.

***Anne d'Harnoncourt** (Mrs. Joseph J. Rishel) Philadelphia

Author, museum curator, art historian and the Director of the Philadelphia Museum of Art, she is an expert on Twentieth Century Art. She serves on the visiting committee of the Harvard Art Museum, the Museum and Arts panels of the National Endowment for the Arts, the boards of the Hirschhorn Museum, the International Committee of Museums, and the U. of P. Graduate School of Fine Arts.

***Harriet W. McGeehan** (Mrs. Robert L. McGeehan) West Hazleton

An active leader in public life, she is the spokesman of the Pennsylvania Commission on Women for projects of the Department of Aging. She has served on major national and international bodies of the United Church of Christ, and has held prominent roles with the Pennsylvania Women's Campaign Fund, the Pennsylvania League of Women Voters, and the American Association of University Women. She has received national and international awards.

***Rhoda Wagner Richards** (Mrs. J. Permar Richards, Jr.) Bryn Mawr

Talented executive, artist and horticulturist, recipient of many awards, she is the chairman of the recently-established Emergency Aid Foundation of Pennsylvania. A leader in the campaign for preservation of heritage landmarks in Center City Philadelphia, and for the Preservation Coalition of Greater Philadelphia, she won the Coalition's prime objective, reform in zoning structure.

***Lucile Johnson Rosenbloom** (Mrs. Charles J. Rosenbloom) Pittsburgh

As first harpist with the Rochester and Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestras, she won fame throughout the U.S. and Europe. She founded the Harp Department of the Eastman School of Music, the American Harp Society and the International Harp Competition. She has toured South America with Toscanini, played at the White House, and was the author-narrator of the broadcast program, "Great Harpists of the World."

***Helen Waite Papashvily** (Mrs. George Papashvily) Quakertown

Her best seller *Anything Can Happen*, the story of her husband's experiences as an immigrant, catapulted her and her husband into national and international fame. Translated into a movie, this book has helped significantly to promote racial, religious and ethnic understanding. In addition to her career as a writer, she has given strong support to libraries.

***Frieda G. Shapira** (Mrs. Saul F. Shapira) Pittsburgh

For her important and generous contributions as a volunteer for many non-profit organizations, she has been cited as one of the most important community leaders in Pittsburgh. Although her board memberships and offices reflect a broad range of interests, the common denominator is the human service emphasis. She is equally well known for contributions to the advancement of human rights.

Nancy M. Neuman (Mrs. Mark Neuman) Lewisburg

Twelfth president of the League of Women Voters of the United States, she has been a recipient of honorary degrees and other important awards. Her leadership and organizing talents have been dedicated to equal rights, better housing and neighborhood preservation to name only a few of her concerns.

***Adele Warden Paxson** (Mrs. Henry D. Paxson) Holicong

A fine musician, she has been the force behind the founding of the Opera Company of Philadelphia and the Bucks County Opera Association. A continuing interest in the education of young artists has been demonstrated both by her presidency of the Academy of Vocal Arts and her sponsorship of the International Pavarotti Voice Competition. She is also respected for competence in the breeding of thoroughbred horses.

Elisabeth Shellenberger Philadelphia

A life-long dedication to sports merited her induction into the Sports Hall of Fame. With the U.S. Hockey teams she competed in four Olympic Games and later served as judge and on the board of the World Hockey Association. Another major commitment has been volunteer service to encourage the development of sports abilities in children.

***Gweneth T. Zarfoss** (Mrs. Samuel K. Zarfoss) Harrisburg

She was a certified psychologist and with Pearl Buck wrote a book about our debt to retarded children. A talent for natural history was expressed through her wildlife garden and participation in both the Bromeliad and the Audubon Societies.

She has taught the writing of children's books and children's literature, published children's books, articles and book reviews.

Born in Pennsylvania, she is an internationally renowned mezzo-soprano and opera singer who first sang in public at the age of four. She was the first American to be awarded the Afidelio Gold Medal by the International Association of Opera Directors. In 1992 for the Rossini bicentennial she performed at Rossini celebrations throughout the world as the quintessential Rossini interpreter.

***The Hon. Lisa A Richette** Philadelphia

Judge of the Philadelphia Court of Common Pleas, she is a nationally recognized jurist, author, lecturer and activist for human rights. Her concerns consistently focus on children, women, mental patients and prisoners. Her pioneering book was entitled *Throwaway Children*. During her career as litigator, she became chief of the Family Court Division of the Philadelphia District Attorney's office.
